THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Only a week since the Wise men encountered a child and now we celebrate the Baptism of our Lord at thirty years of age. It's known that this was considered the age of maturity; an age when people would at least consider Jesus to be someone worth listening to. But we could wonder where has he been up until now? How has he been preparing himself, maybe by living the life more ordinary?

When he was living as a refugee child did Jesus learn what it was like to be turned away by people who would not 'suffer little children'? Did the experience of a loving son seeing his mother struggling to make ends meet, see her in the widow scorned for the paltry gift she offered to the Temple? Did he live the experiences of a man needing to provide for his family; taking the work he could find; working the docks, spending nights on the hills watching the sheep, standing in the market square waiting for the overseers to take on labourers for the harvest, seeing people exploit others as so much property, caring for friends crippled through exploitation and need.

If we want to imagine the ordinary life of Jesus maybe we get our best clues in how his public ministry is lived out. When we get involved in charity or acts of social justice then we are part of this ministry that Jesus commits himself to. We have a few opportunities for people to take part in before we commit to our Lenten focus in a few weeks' time.

Foodbank - We will be visiting the Foodbank shortly. It may be that you have now cleared your cupboards of the Christmas shopping but if you do have any food items that have at least 4 weeks until expiry, or if you would like to make a donation of any extra toiletries then please do send them in next week.

Mission – Again, Christmas is a time for new clothes so if you have any spare coats, gloves, hats or scarves that are in good condition and looking for a new home, then please send them in and we will deliver them to charities working with the homeless.

Spectacles – Spring cleaning 'that' drawer can turn up spare 'specs' which can be sent out to refugee centres and mission hospitals. They can usually be donated back to the optician or can be sent into school and we will forward them on.
